**GENERAL ORDER RE: IMPLEMENTATION OF EMERGENCY RELIEF
AUTHORIZED PURSUANT TO GOVERNMENT CODE SECTION 68115 BY CHAIR
OF JUDICIAL COUNCIL**

Exercising the authority granted under Government Code section 68115 and the March 19, 2020 Order (“Order”) of Chief Justice Tani G. Cantil-Sakauye, Chair of the Judicial Council of California, issued in response to the March 18, 2020 request for an emergency order made by the Superior Court of Siskiyou County (“Court”), this Court HEREBY FINDS AND ORDERS AS FOLLOWS:

1. For purposes of computing time for filing papers with the Court under Code of Civil Procedure sections 12 and 12a, from March 23, 2020 to April 17, 2020, inclusive, are deemed holidays (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(4));

2. For purposes of computing time under Penal Code section 825, and Welfare and Institutions Code sections 313, 315, 334, 631, 632, 637, and 657, from March 23, 2020 to April 17, 2020, inclusive, are deemed holidays (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(5));

3. In cases in which the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from March 23, 2020 to April 17, 2020, inclusive, the Court hereby extends the time periods provided in sections 583.310 and 583.320 of the Code of Civil Procedure to bring an action to trial by 30 days (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(6));

4. The Court hereby extends by 30 days the duration of any temporary restraining order that would otherwise expire from March 23, 2020 to April 17, 2020, inclusive, if the emergency condition described in the Order prevents the Court from conducting proceedings to determine whether a permanent order should be entered (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(7));

5. In cases in which the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from March 23, 2020 to April 17, 2020, inclusive, the Court hereby extends the time period provided in section 825 of the Penal Code within which a defendant charged with a felony offense must be taken before a magistrate from 48 hours to 7 days (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(8));

6. In cases in which the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from March 23,

1 2020 to April 17, 2020, inclusive, the Court hereby extends the time period provided in
2 section 859b of the Penal Code for the holding of a preliminary examination from 10 court days
3 to 15 court days (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(9));

4 7. In cases in which the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from March 23,
5 2020 to April 17, 2020, inclusive, the Court hereby extends the time period provided in
6 section 1382 of the Penal Code for the holding of a criminal trial by 30 days (Gov. Code,
7 § 68115(a)(10));

8 8. In cases in which the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from March 23,
9 2020 to April 17, 2020, inclusive, the Court hereby extends the time period provided in
10 section 313 of the Welfare and Institutions Code within which a minor taken into custody
11 pending dependency proceedings must be released from custody to 7 days (Gov. Code,
12 § 68115(a)(11));

13 9. In cases in which the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from March 23,
14 2020 to April 17, 2020, inclusive, the Court hereby extends the time period provided in
15 section 315 of the Welfare and Institutions Code within which a minor taken into custody
16 pending dependency proceedings must be given a detention hearing to 7 days (Gov. Code,
17 § 68115(a)(11));

18 10. In cases in which the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from March 23,
19 2020 to April 17, 2020, inclusive, the Court hereby extends the time periods provided in
20 sections 632 and 637 of the Welfare and Institutions Code within which a minor taken into
21 custody pending wardship proceedings and charged with a felony must be given a detention
22 hearing or rehearing to 7 days (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(11));

23 11. In cases in which the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from March 23,
24 2020 to April 17, 2020, inclusive, the Court hereby extends the time period provided in
25 section 334 of the Welfare and Institutions Code within which a hearing on a juvenile
26 dependency petition must be held to 15 days (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(12)); and

27 12. In cases in which the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from March 23,
28 2020 to April 17, 2020, inclusive, the Court hereby extends the time period provided in

1 section 657 of the Welfare and Institutions Code within which a hearing on a wardship petition
2 for a minor charged with a felony offense must be held by 15 days (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(12)).
